FROM THE DESK OF THE MAYOR



It is a very busy time here in the City. One item that is receiving a lot of our focus and effort is the Draft 2017 Budget that was scheduled to be presented to the Council at a Work Session on September 29, 2016. We are striving to prepare a budget that addresses current needs but also considers the needs of the future.

On September 13, I, along with Councilmembers, past elected officials, and staff members, attended the groundbreaking ceremony at The Villages MPD site. The event was attended by many people who learned the new name for that development is "Ten Trails."

Now that the project is fully permitted, you have probably noticed demolition, site preparation, and construction of the new Black Diamond Elementary School has begun. City staff is diligently inspecting and overseeing the infrastructure improvements, erosion control, and all aspects of building construction. The new school will be two stories and will house approximately 450 students; it is scheduled to open in the Fall of 2017. During construction students and staff will spend the 2016-2017 school year in the J.J. Smith Elementary building, located in Enumclaw.

The 102nd Labor Day celebration this year was a huge success and very well attended. There were many games for children as well as adults, prizes for everyone, good food and many interesting booths, as well as a wonderful parade. I would like to thank the many volunteers, vendors, and sponsors, who work very hard to put on this wonderful annual event; all your work is appreciated and has not gone unnoticed.

LOOKING FORWARD TO A BETTER STRETCH OF ROBERTS DRIVE

The City is midway through the design and permitting process to improve Roberts Drive from the west side of Rock Creek Bridge to City Hall. The improvements will include shoulder widening, sidewalks on the south side, street lights, and street overlay. So if the bumpy ride through Morganville and the banging of the trucks and the walking in puddles on the side of the road, and the dark spots at night when you go out to get the mail and the narrowness of the pavements when a truck is going by and the difficulty of safely walking west past the bridge has got you down. The 5 Big Residential Urban Stormwater Impacts & *What to do about it*



Your Car: Yes, even clean new vehicles spread contaminated silt, spread heavy metals and hydrocarbons and other car fluids. The best thing you can do is keep your vehicle maintained well. ***Don't drip and drive!***

Your Pet: In a dense urban environment there also is a high density of pets. We have public sewers to deal with human waste, but there is no waste collection system for your pets other than YOU! Please ***pick up after your pet*** (dispose in trash). The high density of dogs and cats with minimal natural areas in the urban environment pollutes the storm-water runoff.

Your yard: First of all ***minimize*** the use of ***fertilizers***. The disposal of your yard waste into a big pile over the bank can cause high nutrient rich leachate to drain into stormwater systems and then streams. If you don't have a good well drained location with good sub-surface drainage, then a more acceptable solution would be sign up for yard disposal service. ***Proper composting*** is a great solution when done properly and then use the compost rather than fertilizing. See King County's website for composting tips.

Your outdoor cleaning: Take note of where your outdoor wash water is draining to. If it is draining into the catch basin in the street, stop immediately, because you would be breaking the law. Pull your car onto the lawn so that the wash water will soak in. ***Contain and or direct the runoff from your washing operation so that it soaks into the ground.***

Your solid waste: Some of the just around our house that should go to the dump just tends to stack up. Stack of junk can also increase the pollutant levels of runoff. ***Take advantage of recycle events.***

Business License renewals are coming soon.....

The City of Black Diamond has over 300 businesses that operate in the City throughout the calendar year. These include retail stores, restaurants, real estate agents, hair salons, daycares, construction firms and more. Some of these businesses have storefronts here in Black Diamond, others are home occupations, and still more perform frequent business in Black Diamond but have offices elsewhere.

The Black Diamond Municipal Code 2.58 requires businesses operating in the City of Black Diamond have a current license. The license helps ensure all businesses have acquired the appropriate state licenses and permits, adhere to the zoning guidelines, conform to all building codes, and meet safety requirements. Most businesses are characterized as regular licenses, but the City also has some specialty licenses for pawnbrokers, carnivals, adult entertainment, firearms, solicitors/mobile vendors and utility licenses. Some businesses may require more than one type of license. Solicitors are required to obtain their license before contacting the public. Background checks are performed on every solicitor operating in Black Diamond. If they are not able to produce a copy of the solicitor license upon request, they are not approved to solicit within City limits.

Business license permitting fees are based on the type of business, location and period of operation. The majority of Black Diamond businesses are classified as regular, which are \$70 new and renew at \$60 annually. Renewal forms will be sent out in mid-December. Renewals not post-marked by January 31, 2017, will be assessed a \$10 late fee. Late fees will continue to assess monthly if license fees are not paid. Anyone not renewed by May 1, 2017, will be sent to a collection agency for unpaid fees. If your business has closed or no longer is working in Black Diamond please return the renewal form with that information written on the form. The City will cancel the license.

If you have any questions, please contact the City at 360-886-5700. We would like this process to be as simple as possible. Please remember to sign and return the renewal form and enclose the payment.

Checks should be made payable to the City of Black Diamond. If you are a new business, applications are available on the City website or at City Hall. Generally a new license will have a fee of \$70, unless it is a specialty license or a temporary.

Don't forget to change your clocks back one hour on Sunday, November 6, 2016



City Budget Planning and Calendar...

All City departments have been busy preparing the City's annual operating budget for 2017. The Operating Budget funds services associated with public safety, public works, parks, planning, permitting and other municipal services.

The budget tells the City's financial story and sets spending targets for the programs and services that city residents receive. During August and September Department Heads and the Finance Department updated 2017 revenue forecasts for the General Fund and other funds using 2016 trends, growth projections and forecast information provided by Municipal Research and Services Center and other agencies.

A Special Council Meeting was held on September 29th on revenue and potential property tax increases, as well as a workstudy for revenue and expenditure forecasts in the General Fund, and proposed 2017 budgets for all City Funds. Other workstudy sessions are scheduled for Council on October 18th and 27th at 6pm in the Council Chambers.

Public hearings are scheduled for October 27th and November 17th and December 1st. Public input is always welcomed and encouraged.
